Suggested Approach:

The reasons we train interprofessionally are not always explicit. One of the most important reasons is to improve safety, both for patients and for their health care providers. The first article describes a simulation exercise with health professional students at the University of Washington. The second article describes the IP Certificate program developed at Dalhousie University.

The 3rd article is included to generate some interesting discussion about IP roles and effects on Specialist Physicians, as it is very topical right now. The focus will only be on the IP sections, page 4 in the executive summary and then pages 34-40.
